FROM OUR CHAIR

At the end of my 2nd year as a trustee and Interim Chair, I look back with an overall sense of satisfaction and pride for what we have achieved. This year has seen us continue to develop our mission of giving only the best possible service to our communities. As you will read in the Director's and Treasurer's reports we considerably increased our revenue in comparison to the previous year and this has enabled us to carry out some focused developmental work in the area of economic inclusion. This in turn has generated a wealth of information to better support BAME businesses in the city. An example of immediate concrete outcome, aside from the research documents and frameworks, is the creation of the Bristol Urban, Enterprise and Innovation Network. I wish to conclude by thanking the BSWN fantastic duo: the Director – Sado Jirde and the Project Coordinator Mina Drobna – not many people would be aware of the sacrifices you have made in the interest of the organisation, you are a great team and it has been a pleasure working with you. I also want to thank the volunteers for all their hard work during 2018. 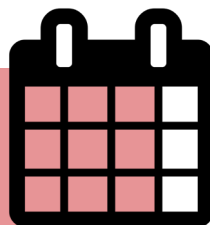

Our cultural inclusions work focuses on the relationships between heritage of race, identity, and belonging for the Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic (BAME) community in Bristol. Recent local and national events have thrust into the spotlight the complicated nature of race and racism, nation, citizenship, inequality, and belonging in the UK, and at the centre of many of these debates are the BAME community. Our projects aid in developing and delivering arts and heritage projects in partnership with the BAME communities, BAME led arts organisations, and mainstream arts and heritage organisations.

Through our Cultural Inclusion projects, we were able to engage **816** community members, organisations and public sector figures in the South West.

Policy, Research & Community Consultations

BSWN is research and data-driven and we seek to utilise robust and academically sound information collected through strong ties with academic institutions, think tanks and funders to highlight the issues that BAME communities face. The consultation and research that we do provides a flow of information that allows marginalised voices the opportunity to be heard and influence the decision and policy making process in the city.

BSWN also works in partnership with key city institutions and structures such as City Office - One City Plan, Strategic City Funds, as well as attending key strategic meetings to inform public policy. In addition, working with national partners BSWN has been able to also contribute to national policy through participation in CORE - Coalition of Race Equality organisations working together to address racial inequality.

Economic Inclusion

Despite the great potential and economic growth in the city of Bristol, it is well documented that the wealth is not shared equally across its inhabitants, with BAME groups being disproportionately disadvantaged when it comes to access economic opportunities. BSWN working with partners has developed an economic inclusion strategy underpinned by the concept of 'Inclusive Growth' in order to drive economic growth in inner city Bristol. The approach is place based - to build the infrastructure required to help economic activity at a community level. The strategy focusses on enterprise, social enterprise and skills development situated within an innovation and enterprise hub.

Our commitment to Inclusive growth and challenging economic inequality is demonstrated by our facilitation and participation in the following events:

Furthermore, the first half of 2018 has seen a significant progress in the development of our Economic Inclusion Strategy through commissioned funding by Bristol City Council to undertake research on BAME businesses, provision of policy briefs to the West of England Combined Authority, and consultations and securing project funding from Barrow Cadbury Trust to deliver a project on developing the BAME social enterprise and social investment market.

Political Participation

In order to effectively challenge racial inequality, BSWN uses its expertise to facilitate dialogues and develop relationships between stakeholders through which progress can be achieved in a manner that ensures adequate voice for the BAME communities. BSWN actively works on strengthening the voice of BAME communities in influencing the development and design of policies and services through engagement with decision makers. This encourages wider participation with the democratic processes in the city.

Our mission to widen political participation was illustrated by organising two West of England Mayoral Election 2017 BAME Roundtable Events, one on the 13th and the other on the 21st April 2017. Organising two events allowed us to engage all 5 candidates for the post of the Metro Mayor, as well as provided two opportunities for community members to engage the candidates of crucial community concerns.

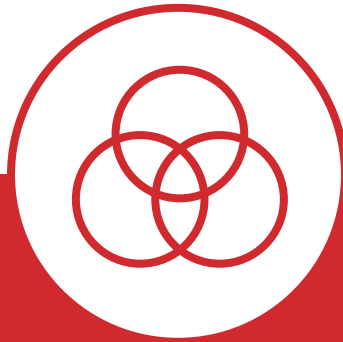

- 2.** Build BSWN research capacity to produce robust data on racial inequality to challenge and address negative outcomes for BAME people in education, labour market, health & housing through partnership work academic institutions in the region
- 3.** Test the implementation of BSWN's economic inclusion strategy aimed at driving economic growth through

the development of enterprise, social enterprise and skills development through an innovation hub located in inner city Bristol

- 4.** Produce cultural inclusion programmes on the themes of race, identity, belonging as well the development of BSWN as a leading BAME ICH infrastructure org in line with the HLF Resilience bid BSWN also works in partnership with key city institutions and structures such City Office - One City Plan, Strategic City Funds, as well as attending key strategic meetings to inform public policy.
